

Theme

Should and can artificial intelligence be regulated? Worldwide, the technological landscape is today largely driven by what seems to be an exponential development of Artificial Intelligence tools, based on powerful algorithms and known as "systems". Some say that we are facing the "most profound human revolution in history". In this new landscape, new issues are beginning to emerge, including the fundamental question of regulation. Should AI systems be regulated, and if so, how? In this Main Theme morning session, three discussion panels will analyse the issues, from both generalist and specialist perspectives. A first, multidisciplinary panel of international experts will examine the philosophical and socio-economic underpinnings of any regulation of Artificial Intelligence as the most technologicallyadvanced tool that mankind has ever used on a broad scale. This will lead to a second panel, involving a keynote presentation of the recently-adopted EU AI Act, by one of the EU's legal experts involved in the finalization of the Act as a legal instrument, and who will speculate now on the impact of the Act and Artificial Intelligence in general on practice of the law. Finally, a third panel will take a deep dive into the considerable changes in process and procedure in judicial litigation and arbitration which may result from the use of generative AI systems as virtual legal "assistants" by litigators: a new "eldorado" for litigators? Is there a need to revise the rules of litigation to take generative Al tools into account?

OHADA Law Room 341	Compliance in the service of investment in OHADA law: challenges, issues and perspectives Africa is the continent of all paradoxes. The most encouraging prospects for economic growth, particularly in the post-Covid context and despite the Ukrainian crisis, come with the most alarming figures in terms of corruption and illicit financial flows. Corruption and therefore non-compliance with standards, at all levels of economic life, is unanimously recognized as one of the major obstacles to investment and the emergence of the African economy. In order to contribute to the development of possible solutions to this scourge, on the one hand, and to improving the efficiency of OHADA's normative corpus on the other hand, in terms of its aim of attracting and protecting investment, it has been proposed that the first session – both analytical and prospective – be organized on the subject of compliance in the service of investment in OHADA law (Organization for the Harmonization of Business Law in Africa). The session aims to analyze the evolution of OHADA's material rules and compare them with compliance-related requirements in the particular context of investment, in order to assess their accuracy and appropriateness in this context. The Impact of Labor Law on Foreign Investments. Case Study

When a particular company decides to undertake an investment in a foreign state, it submits the project to an analysis of its feasibility from different perspectives. It is a matter of exploring and concluding on how an organization will manage the risks and opportunities. The analysis is naturally focused on certain classic aspects such as the expected economic profitability, the tax conditions, the financing situation, the market, among others. We will focus on analyzing the impact of labor law on foreign investments.

On the base of a Case Study, we will examine how projects of this nature are affected by labor law regulations; the legal and factual situation of workers' unions; the existence of collective labor agreements; the different alternatives in hiring conditions; the necessity and/or convenience of hiring local personnel or, on the contrary, sending expatriates, tax implications, costs involved, timing, etc.

Representation of foreign victims in a trial

Theme

Are you, or do you know, a lawyer in your country who could represent foreign victims or their family during a criminal investigation and trial and explain them their rights?

Initially this was a request from the French prosecutor concerned about the protection of his compatriots abroad. Today, from this starting point, we wish to exchange experiences and views on the way things are done in each country in order to go beyond mere comparisons and create general reflections on victims, who are deemed to be the reason for existence of any judicial system.

Here are the initial questions which will be used to liven up this debate.

An attack, an accident or dispossession - these mean criminal proceedings for us.

- Is it possible to have access to the criminal dossier, and from what point on?
- During the investigation? From the police? From an investigating magistrate? From the prosecutor?
- And what do lawyers need if they can and want to intervene?
- What must be proven to get the status of a victim recognized?
- Is it necessary or useful for criminal proceedings to have already been initiated in France?
- What are the procedures for recovering a victim's body? Is the authorization from a judge required?
- Are there any French-speaking specialist lawyers for victims?
- Will victims or their loved ones be heard by the courts?
- Can victims assert their rights to criminal damages, like civil parties in France, or only before a civil judge?
- Are there any victim support associations in your jurisdiction?
- How long does a trial last? After how long can we expect to obtain a ruling on the damages? Incidentally, with regard to costs and lawyer's fees:
- What are the fees for assisting a victim? Do you know of any examples?
- Would you be ready to work pro bono?
- Can you ask for only result-based fees?
- Can a French victim get a lawyer through legal aid services and if so, under what conditions?

From the Rana Plaza tragedy to today: what are the civil and criminal responsibilities of companies in the textile sector?

In 2013, almost two years after the approval of the Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights by the United Nations Human Rights Council, the Rana Plaza tragedy in Bangladesh highlighted the serious failures of multinationals with regard to the respect of human rights in the textile sector and contributed to global awareness on the issue.

Three highly current topics requiring urgent discussion will be addressed. And thirdly, the analysis of current experiences in different jurisdictions with respect to the appropriateness of setting up bodies specialised in bankruptcy and insolvency matters or in avoiding such proceedings and seeking less judicial intervention as this increases corruption and involves excessive bureaucracy, harming creditors and the economy.

Boundless Artistry in a Fragmented, AI-Driven World: Marrying Art Law and Immigration Law to Maximize Creativity, Mobility, and Sustainability

Creativity knows no bounds, no borders, Indeed, with the rise of virtual events since the global pandemic, groundbreaking art does not have to be created necessarily in the physical world. It now can be created anywhere, including the metaverse, potentially with the use of artificial intelligence. It is in this brave new world that the practice of art law must pivot nimbly, in order to remain relevant and effective for clientele. At the same time, the rise of remote work, with its underlying premise of working from anywhere, has been both a blessing and a challenge for immigration lawyers. Globetrotting employees, and employers who increasingly can source services globally, test the foundation of physicality upon which the practice of immigration law has been based. Artificial intelligence (AI) systems, particularly general-purpose ones, are accelerating the transformation of companies and business models. Regulatory projects are multiplying: some are now at a very advanced stage, others already in force on a sector-by-sector basis. In the EU, following the political agreement reached on December 23, 2023, the regulation on AI systems is expected to take effect this year. In the USA, a draft on the transparency of foundation models was submitted on December 22, 2023. The obligations at stake have become increasingly onerous and are being imposed in conjunction with requirements under personal data law. For innovators and investors, understanding and implementing this regulatory trend is a major challenge. 

Tourist Activities for Accompanying Persons

Reservations for tourist activities should be made directly through the LaFayette agency (congresuia@lafayettedmc.com). A desk will be available at the Palais des Congrès from 9am to 5pm from 30 October to 2 November.

Some tours have a limited number of places and reservations will be taken on a first-come, first-served basis. We therefore recommend reserving places for spouses/guests in advance. Payments must be made in euros. Final departure times for tourist activities will be communicated to participants by the agency.

A minimum number of 10 participants is required for each activity, without which the activity may be postponed or cancelled (in which case a refund will be offered). LaFayette will not provide refunds for any no-shows on the day of the activity.

All the activities offered below are exclusively reserved for UIA Congress attendees. The official language for all the activities is English. Depending on the number of participants and the languages spoken, sub-groups may be formed.

Walking tour in Montmartre Wednesday, 30 October ■ Morning Price: €40 per person

Fontainebleau Castle Thursday, 31 October Morning and afternoon

The Chateau de Fontainebleau stands as a testament to the opulence and grandeur of French Renaissance architecture.

Ladies of the Left Bank Friday, 1st November ■ Morning Price: €35 € per person

Dare to wear petticoats – today your tour is all about women! Often less known to the general public, they have always been the shadows behind great men. From the Middle Ages to the present day, your visit will plunge you into an eventful history of combat, devotion and character. It was between Saint-Michel, the Pantheon, the Luxembourg Gardens and Saint-Germain des Prés that part of their history was written. Whether witch, poisoner, queen, saint, scientist, politician, revolutionary or writer, these women will surprise you as much as they will fascinate you.



Vaux-le-Vicomte Castle Saturday, 2 November ■ Morning & Early Afternoon Price: €132,50 per person



Vaux-le-Vicomte Castle, located in Maincy near Melun, is a grand 17th century baroque château renowned for its architectural harmony and stunning gardens. Designed by the architect, Louis Le Vau, the landscape architect, André Le Nôtre, and the painter-decorator, Charles Le Brun, the castle epitomizes classical French grandeur. It was built for Nicolas Fouquet, Louis XIV's Finance Minister, who hosted a legendary inauguration fête that led to his downfall.




